you shed light on the path to take Nehemiah 9:12

We are well into the hot, humid days of summer. I often feel more lethargic during these days, but kids and church always revive me! We had so much fun recently at our Summer Bible School. Pastor Alan McNamara (from 1st Congregational UCC in DeKalb) and I donned silly costumes and presented skits each week about Jonah's troubled relationship with God and the people of Nineveh. There are a few pictures in this newsletter to give you an idea of the activities we shared on those nights.

And then I read about the kids that attended the United Church of Christ's recent General Synod. Several leaders of the denomination met with the Youth Delegates. Outgoing General Minister/President Rev. John Dorhauer told the youth, "This is your church, and every generation has to stand up and own it for themselves. I'm proud of every one of you. Create the church you want to be a part of."

The church we attend today is not the church of our childhood. As much as we may wish to stand still and preserve everything "the way its always been," that is not God's way. God continues to create and change, and so must we. God continually breathes life into each of us, our communities, and the world. Stop for a moment, close your eyes, and take a slow deep breath. What have you noticed God creating recently? How has God been nudging you to do something new? Where do you feel pulled to be involved in your church or community? Jonah had a very direct message of what to do but he resisted because he didn't like the people he was supposed to help. I wonder how often we ignore God's messages when they don't fit with our own visions.

In a recent webinar, the participants were asked to consider revising the questions we ask – to set aside fixating on the number of people in the pews or dollars in the offering. Instead, ask what is God up to today? The prophet Nehemiah references God's leading the Israelites through the wilderness: "By day you led them with a pillar of cloud, and by night with a pillar of fire to give them light on the way they were to take." Trust in God was necessary while they navigated an uncertain terrain; and so it is for us. I think I'm ready for whatever kind of church God wants us to be - I hope I'm more open than Jonah! I'm ready for the new, the innovative, the continually creating and recreating that is led by the Spirit of God! How exciting!

THE MAYFIELD MONARCH WAYSTATION AND THE 15TH ANNUAL DEKALB COUNTY GARDEN WALK

The Mayfield Monarch Waystation was the educational spotlight garden on the 2023 DeKalb County Garden Walk. This was a wonderful opportunity to pursue our church's Creation Stewardship mission and to (re)introduce Mayfield Church, post-pandemic, to many people from around the County.

We welcomed 326 community members to the Waystation on July 15! We shared important information about the benefits to people and to the environment of planting native plants for butterflies and other pollinators, and showed them how beautiful native plants can be in the garden. People asked lots of questions and seemed to enjoy the Waystation.

We also welcomed folks to the church itself, offering information about Mayfield Church and a chance to see the sanctuary and use the facilities. People were happy to receive Waystation water bottles and monarch coasters.

Many thanks to Randy Caspersen, Sue Goudy, Caroline Quinlan, and Diana Swanson for serving as hosts and for weeding and planting since mid-May to prepare the Waystation for the Walk. Many thanks to Pastor Lauri and Moderator Sophia Varcados for organizing and staffing the church's information/welcome table.

JONAH, THE WHALE, AND THE WATER

Our intergenerational Summer Bible School has wrapped up! We had a wonderful time filled with skits, songs, water justice presenters, Bible Study, crafts, activities, and stories. One adult commented, "What a great experience! Everything was awesome. Fun, educational, thought-provoking, uplifting."

- Week one we learned about compassion. Heather Edwards from DeKalb County Community Garden demonstrated the role water plays in providing food for our neighbors.
- Week two we learned about resistance and forgiveness. Dean Johnson from DeKalb County Soil and Water Conservation District explained how the choices each person makes affect the quality of water that we all share.
- Week three we learned about grace. Kurt Thurmaier from the Tanzanian Development Support told us about the school in Africa and how much time (and strength!) it takes to bring water for home use.
- Week four we learned about the need for change. Diana Swanson from the Friends of Jane Adeny Memorial School for Girls in Kenya talked to us about the school and how having easy access to water changes the lives of the girls, their families, and their educational opportunities.



UCC 34TH GENERAL SYNOD HIGHLIGHTS

All United Church of Christ members were invited to gather at the 34th General Synod in Indianapolis from June 30 through July 4, 2023. Each UCC Conference sent delegates to vote on business and resolutions. While we cannot include everything that happened during Synod, here are some of the highlights:

The General Synod's **theme** was from Revelation 21:5 — "Behold, I am making everything new."

New leader elected – Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson was elected as General Minister and President, the first woman and the first black woman to lead our denomination.

The future General Synod **meetings frequency** was changed from every two years to every three years; the change will take effect following General Synod 35 which will meet in Kansas City, MO on July 11-15, 2025.

Youth @ Synod: What brings young people to the UCC? by Renee DeLuca. UCC leaders met with the youth attending Synod to field their questions. During one session, outgoing General Minister/President Rev. John Dorhauer told them, "This is your church, and every generation has to stand up and own it for themselves. I'm proud of every one of you. Create the church you want to be a part of." Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson asked for advice on bringing more young people to the UCC, and the overwhelming response was the use of social media. Voting resolutions and results:

Committee 1: Abortion is healthcare, General Synod says.

Committee 2: Delegates vote to pursue reparative acts for Native Boarding Schools.

Committee 3: Synod takes stand for digital justice, calls for increased accessibility.

Committee 4: Synod delegates pass resolution of witness on electrification.

Committee 5: Delegates call on churches to commit to harm reduction advocacy.

Committee 6: 'Hope is a verb': Synod calls for turning 'Guns to Gardens'.

Committee 7: In narrow vote, Synod supports reparation efforts for Hawaiian language revitalization.

Committee 8: Delegates reject resolution on plant-based living.

Committee 9: Synod delegates call for reduction in single-use plastics and overall plastic pollution.

Committee 10: Synod takes stand for public school educators, academic freedom and equity efforts in schools.

Committee 11: Delegates call for study, developing reparations for African Americans.

Committee 12: After debate about wording, Synod declares 'prolonged solitary confinement' as torture.

Committee 13: Synod overwhelmingly affirms dignity of trans and nonbinary persons.

Committee 14: Synod delegates call on congregations to declare and create 'white supremacy free zones'

Rev. Thompson spoke about the hope she sees springing forth within the UCC:

"Here is the place where we have seen the Spirit of God poured forth among us in many ways. Here is the place where we continue to identify the many accomplishments of the ancestors. Here is where we honor the resilience of those who came before us, took risk and oftentimes did more with less than we currently have. And here is the place we identify as now, as we ponder the call of God to be salt and light to the world."
